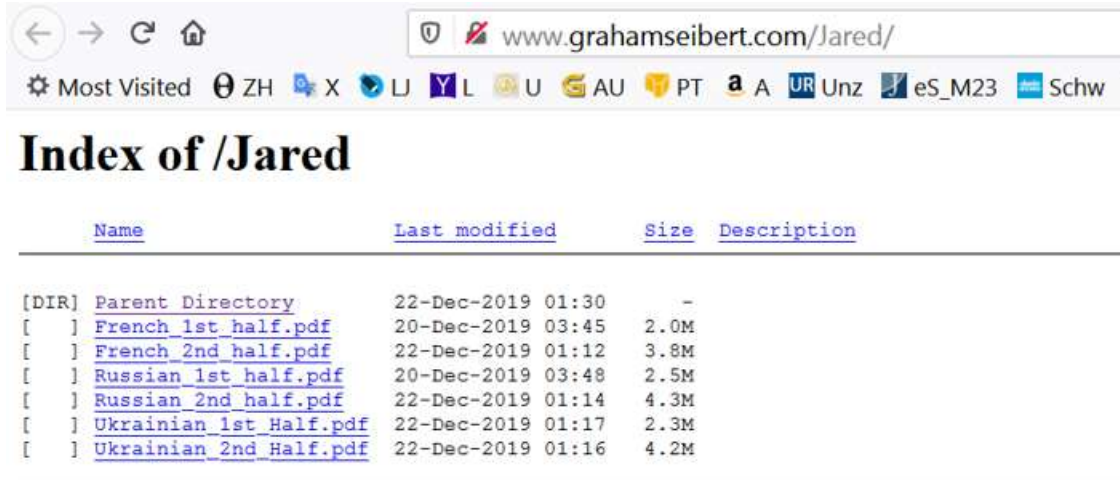


First, you need to have appropriate software. I use Nuance's PDF plus, which costs money, and Adobe's Digital Editions, which is free.

Let me walk you through the Adobe process.

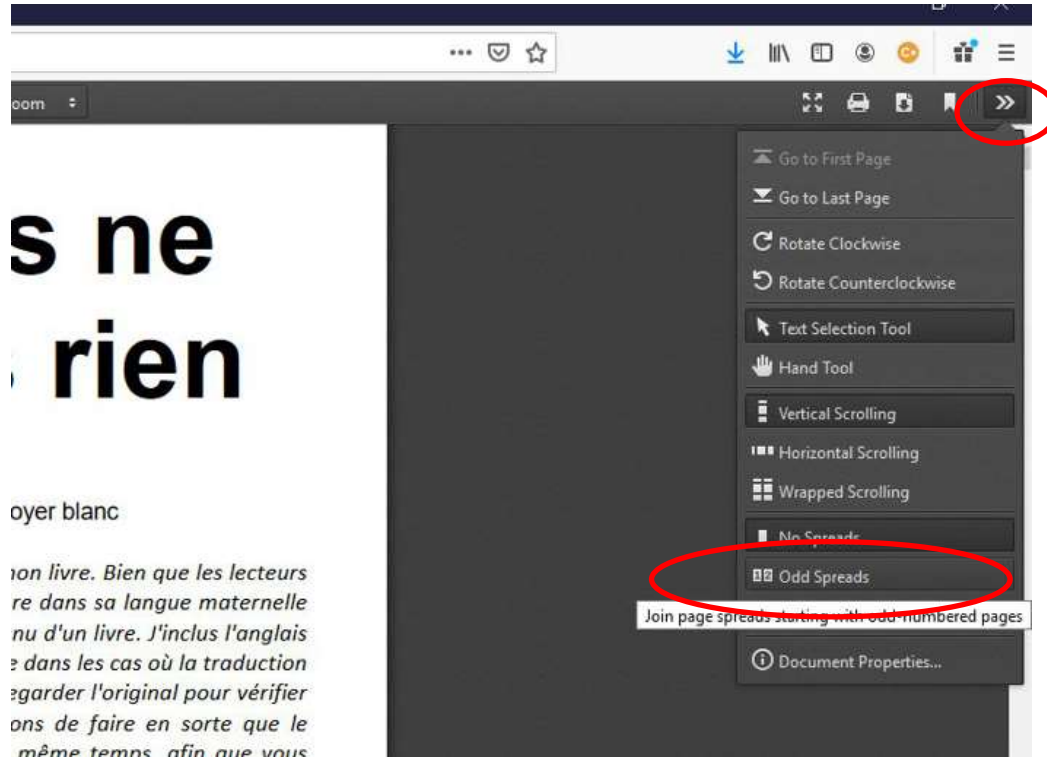
Assuming that you have Adobe Digital Editions installed, navigate to the online library at <http://www.grahamseibert.com/Jared/>. You will see a list of available files. There are two files for every language – I had to split it into in order to overcome limitations in my upload software. Choose the half of the document you want.



Double-click on the file you want to open. You will get the following display from Adobe. You may have to tell it to take the default in order to get this far.



Double-click on the gadget clear to the upper right – circled in red in the screenshot above – to get more parameters. Down at the bottom choose Odd Spreads from a menu that looks like this:



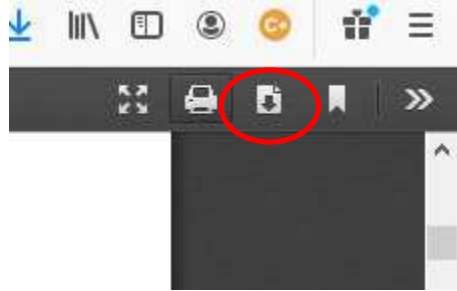
You should get to facing pages that look like this:



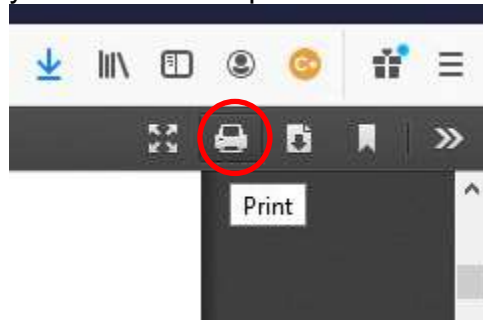
from this point, every time you press page down should advance it two pages, so you're always looking at the translated language on the left and the English on the right.

Here is how to print hard copy.

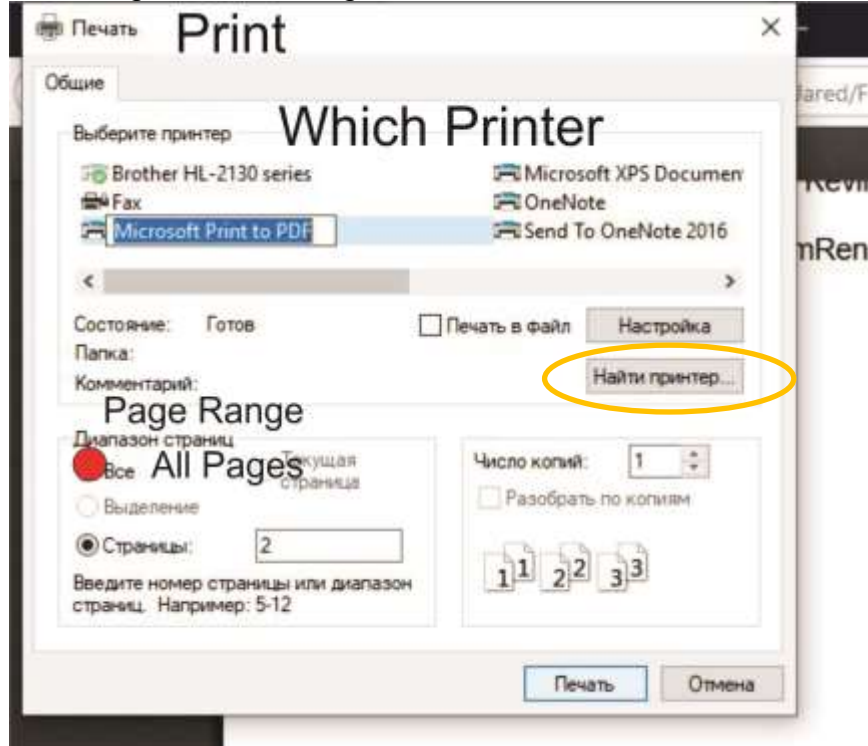
Download the file to a PDF, using this icon.



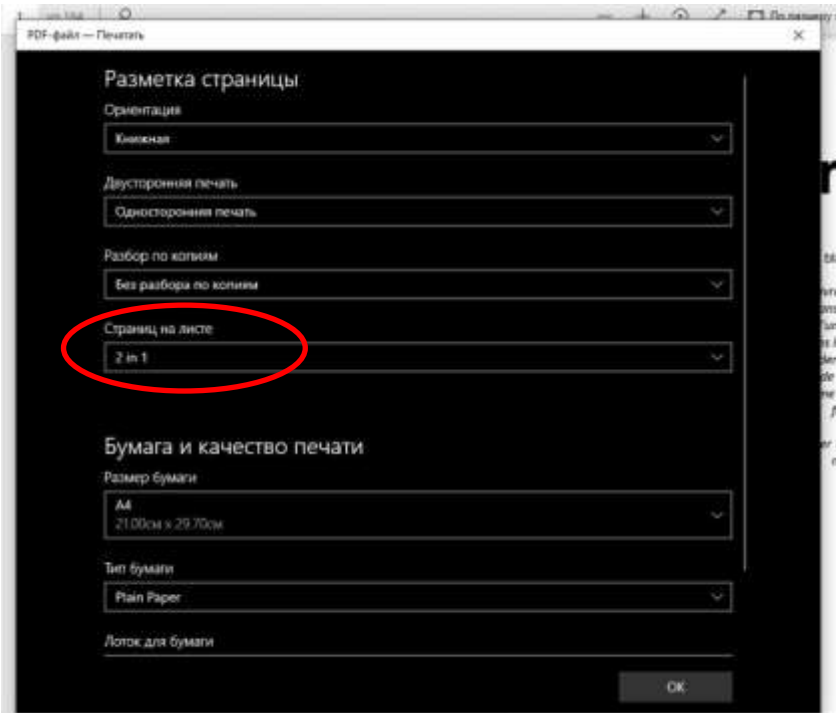
The file goes to your downloads folder. Double-click on the file. Adobe will open up for you. Select the print icon.



You will get the following menu.



You probably want all pages, the red dot above. If not, choose the page range below. Next, choose Additional Parameters, as circled in orange above. Tell it that you want to print the pages two up, as circled in red below:



Tell it okay, and you should be good to go. Of course, as we all know Microsoft changes things without notice, and we all may be working with different versions of software. Best of luck!
